Flowering the Course!

Dear members,

First of all hello in my new capacity as Vice Captain! Thank you for electing me and I hope I will meet the expectations of our members. I am very happy to see that the new committee is very active and I hope you continue to encourage us to work with the passion we have started with. Additionally I hope this enthusiasm rubs off on you and you feel the need to get stuck in as well! After all, UGC is our club so let's make it better together!

Those of you who read my manifesto will know that there were several items in there so I had better start as soon as possible! The flowering project is something that I am hugely passionate about purely because it is so simple to do yet the effect is massive. I say that it is simple and that is a dangerous word to use! It is simple as long as we plan correctly and plant indigenous low maintenance plants that will flourish under our conditions.

I am proposing that we should go hole by hole to ease the initial planting requirements and allow us to focus in one area at any given time. Please note that this is not going to be a quick fix! This is work that will change the aesthetics of the course for generations to come and so it must be planned properly and carried out correctly.

I would like us to begin on hole 6. There are a few reasons;

 Hole 6 is right on the boundary of the course and fortunately it is surrounded by boundary walls so planting creepers will be easy.

- The hole is a par 3, thus management will be easier which will be a boost for a new project.
- Currently the surroundings of the hole are a bit of a mess so our works will have a greater effect.

This unique set of circumstances will allow us to progress in an easier manner to begin with as we build experience.

As you can see from the

basic plan on the top right of this page and the photo on the bottom left, I am proposing that we use Bougainvillea on this hole. We will use it as a creeper all along the boundary wall on the right and on the walls of the bathroom hut. We will then use the tree variety behind the green on the right and also near the tee box. These are all areas which will not affect the course of play but will add immense aesthetic value to the course.

Why Bougainvillea? It is actually indigenous to South America but during the 1930's, Kew Gardens sent different varieties all over the British Colonies. The varieties thrived forming natural hybrids in each area so one could argue that the East African hybrids are now native to Uganda!

Additionally this plant has a beautiful array of colours ranging from purples and pinks to reds and oranges. Whilst we would associate colour with flowers they are actually white with each pod of 3 flowers surrounded by 3-6 brightly coloured bracts.

Bougainvillea does so well in Uganda because it loves hot weather and has excellent drought resistance. It is ideally suited to our requirements because it is low maintenance and requires little water once established. In fact if over watered the plant tends to remain green, with the flowers and hence the coloured bracts failing to flourish. It is also easy to propagate from tip cuttings so our cost will be reduced.



How will the project work? Well, as I mentioned in my introduction I hope my enthusiasm has rubbed off on you and you are willing to contribute and take ownership! I want members to buy seedlings and plant them together with the course staff in the designated areas.

The costs involved are marginal but it is the actions that we take as members that will change our club. Plant some Bougainvillea and tell your grandchildren how you planted that way back in 2016!

The cost of good Bougainvillea cuttings is 5,000/= per piece and we will need quite a number to get started. We will be buying 2 varieties, the creeper and the tree for the different areas as per requirements.

If you would like to get involved and have some fun then please get in touch with me and let's make that old adage true;

'Golf is a good walk spoiled.' Mark Twain

Let's go one better and make our course a beautiful walk spoiled!

Dear Members,

Whilst notices will always be put on the board and emailed to you where necessary, we shall compile them here in case you miss any and for your records. Some of these are not new but reminders must be sent where we might see a bit of slackening or failure to follow the rules.

It is important that you understand the benefits of implementing the social and formal competition rules on a more equitable level. It will help ensure that we all enjoy our game and that the camaraderie of playing with those outside of our normal playing circle adds to the experience of being part of a dynamic club and not to stop you playing with your friends. Playing with people outside of your usual group might result in new friendships and help to build our club morale.

Etiquette is the key to a successful golf club so we must ensure that we are being courteous to one another and to our staff too! Our staff work long hours so let us appreciate their work and build their confidence to become better at their jobs.

As we are making changes to improve the club we ask members to bear with any inconveniences on works. We also ask you to bear with us as we sort out supply issues, as you are aware we are going through a fair procurement process to get the best prices for the club. There will be minor inconveniences but we kindly request that you understand the situation and respect the rules in place.

Discipline

Dress Code – Please ensure that the regular dress code is adhered to in the Club House and on the Course, in particular;

Course

Appropriate shirts, tucked in.

Club House

No hats/caps inside

- No flip flop shoes
- Shirts with Collars & Sleeves
- No gym clothes apart from the gym and changing room.

Financial

Members who have not paid membership fees for the preceding financial ¼ will not be permitted to play or enter the clubhouse in any context.

With effect from Monday, 11th April, 2016 drinks and food items have been reviewed upwards in line with price changes from suppliers.

Corkage is strictly not allowed and disciplinary measures will be taken against those found to be doing so.

Refreshments at hole 14 must be signed for on production of cards and will be automatically deducted at the end of the day. Visitors must be paid for by a member or using a temporary card. Alternatively we advise you to take drinks from the 10th tee if this is not favourable to you.

Competitions

Draw system - The draw for competitions will be done on a random basis with no requests taken for groups. Pre-arranged pairings and preferred team selections being limited to social and non-competition days.

Non-attendance at designated tee time will be recorded and regular absentees will be politely reminded to abstain from entering until they are reliable.

Furthermore non-attendance to a drawn tee time will result in a fine of the cost of play on the day. Cards for competitions must be submitted regardless of score. Failure to do so will result in an assumption of -3 net and handicap will be adjusted accordingly.

The management of SLOW PLAY will be moderated by course marshals and, whilst we understand that in big competitions play will generally be slower, all players should aim to remain on target for a 4 hour round. Marshalls will prompt slower groups to get a move on and slow players must give way. Failure to do so will result in disciplinary action.

Handicaps

All handicaps will follow the internationally accepted CONGU system.

Handicaps for competitions will be as per the board in lobby.

Staff

Service issues will be addressed directly to a Supervisor, the Manager or a Management Committee Member.

Food orders will no longer be taken directly from the kitchen. Orders must be placed with a waiter and the kitchen shall be out of bounds for members.

Orders will only be taken upon production of a card. No card will mean no service.

Course

Pitch marks on the green must be fixed. If you see pitch marks which were not made by you then be courteous and fix them.

Divots must be replaced either by yourself or your caddy. The divot will not repair itself.

Bunkers must be raked after play. We have provided rakes so please use them.

Snooker & Darts Competitions

Snooker has an interesting history in Uganda but I have yet to verify the true facts from the romantic story. It is said that when Snooker was really taking off at the beginning of the 20th century, the colonial powers brought 12 snooker tables to East Africa. Of these 12, 3 came to Uganda which are now situated at Entebbe Golf Club, previously at City Bar and Uganda Golf Club. I have heard dates ranging from 1908 to 1970's but I have confirmed evidence that snooker was very much alive in East Africa in the 1930's. This is due to the solid silver snooker trophy in the archives room of the Nairobi Gymkhana Sports Club. Our table has a storied history and I am determined to find out the facts! I have asked historian Vali Jamal to help but of course long standing members of the club must have some knowledge of the table so please feel free to help!

Regardless of the actual history it is clear that the snooker table is one of the jewels of the club and we are privileged to own it. So let's use it, as a facility of the club we must take advantage and play.

This year we are going to hold 3 key snooker competitions;

The UGC Snooker Championship

This will be the premier snooker event of the club held every year. Depending on the number of entries it will be a knockout competition featuring group stages, similar to the World Golf Matchplay event! Each match will be played on a best of 3 frames format with the semifinals played over 5 frames and the final over 7 frames. There will be a board in the snooker room with the names of each year's champion.

Cricket Doubles League


You will require a partner to play this game! The basic rules of cricket are that there is a bowler and a batsman; the bowler must pot 11 reds whilst the batsman must pot as many colours as possible to get a high score. The reds stay in the pocket whilst the colours keep coming out after every pot. Once all the reds are potted then the teams switch roles and whoever ends up with the highest score is the winner. As it is a league there will be set matches over a time period and once everybody has played one another twice then a winning team will be declared!

Century

Century is a great game for many people to play, rules allow for up to 8 people to play in each game. The table is set up with all colours but only 1 red. In order to begin scoring points one must first pot the red, once the red is potted it becomes a value of 10 whilst the other balls retain their usual values. Fouls are attributed their usual values but these are removed from your score so it is possible to go into negative numbers! The aim of the game is to reach the exact value of 100. This tournament will be held once a month on Century Night, if we get more than 8 players then the number will be divided evenly into 2-3 brackets and the final 8 will play a decider for the champion. This is more of a social tournament so prizes will be drinks from the club and an honorable mention in the spooker section of the newsletter!

DID AUT KNOMS

Did you know that Ding Junhui, The Chinese Sensation, was immortalized as a cartoon character after becoming World Number 1? The first and only Chinese player to make it to the top of the rankings, the cartoon is about his growth from a shy boy into the best player in the world. It is called Dragon Ball Number 1.





We have recently reintroduced darts to the club and given the board its own area where the competitions signing book used to be. Darts has recently had a global boom with the UK taking a lead by creating a televised league. Amazingly the TV audience consists of millions of fans and very healthy prize money for the players. Our Captain is a keen player and it turns out that many of our members are too!

To begin with, as we gauge interest in the club, we shall have the UGC Darts League. We shall see how many players decide to join and create a league whereby you must play one another twice. We shall play 501, the basic rules are that each player starts at 501 and must reach o. At the end of the league we will have a final which shall be the first and second placed players playing against each other. Each match will be best of 3 and the final will be best of 5.

Once we see that there is more interest then we shall be able to hold more competitions. But as it is now please feel free to make use of these facilities! They are there for our members so please enjoy them and you never know, you may make some new friends in the club!



Ladies Section

If you look at various sources you will find that lady golfers constitute only 20% to 25% of the worldwide total. What is the percentage at our club? It is approximately 10%!

Even New Zealander Lydia Ko, the world number one, is an indigenous South Korean. In fact 4 of the world's top 5 are Korean born. Remarkable statistics that show a clear plan that we can follow to boost women's golf in Uganda.

There are many answers to how they have become so successful but the three key areas are work ethic, parental support and structured development. These all go hand in hand in creating a sustainable environment for girls to become fantastic golfers. As it is our club is a great place for a junior to grow up with plenty of role models from various walks of life.

We urge parents to please bring your children to the club to become junior members and play consistently. Yes this is the ladies section but boys and girls should both be playing as we really have a small number of regular juniors.

We are currently working on a junior development plan together with the pros, Sadi and Deo, so that we can measure performance and see how to get our youngsters improving steadily. That way we shall provide the structured development which will hopefully encourage the work ethic. 
We wish to congratulate Maria Zaramba on being ordained as Lady Canon for the North Kigezi Diocese!
